The Most Historic Place in My Town The Blacksmith Shop in Sergeantsville, NJ

Have you ever listened to the radio station 89.7 WDVR FM? Do you know where the signal originates from? Would you believe it comes from a blacksmith shop on Rosemont-Ringoes Road in Sergeantsville, NJ? Well, it's not a blacksmith shop anymore, but it was.

I found out that the blacksmith shop was built around 1830 by Peter Green. Later in the 1800's, Peter passed on

his blacksmithing job to his son Jacob. Jacob passed the shop on to his two sons, William and Theodore. Theodore was the last blacksmith in the Green family to work in the Sergeantsville blacksmith shop. The Green family passed on the tradition of being a blacksmith for over 100 years!

After the Green family came James "Gussie" Harned. The Harneds were another family who were blacksmiths.

James Harned worked in Rahway with his brother. I was surprised when I read about this because I used to live in Rahway myself. James moved out of the City of Rahway because he was getting tired of the fast, busy city life. That is one of the reasons that we moved out of the city to Delaware Township.

I was lucky enough to get a tour of the blacksmith shop, now known as WDVR.FM, by Mrs. Ginny Napurano. She showed and told me many things including the radio studio where the DJ's do their show. I got a chance to see the DJ, Joe Bud, who hosts a show called "Battle of the Groups" on the radio. He is one of the DJ's that now works at WDVR.FM. Mrs. Napurano told me it took four years to prepare the old blacksmith shop to be a radio station!

When Mrs. Napurano was giving me the tour, I was sort of wondering what it would look like in a real live blacksmith shop. I was lucky enough to get an opportunity to visit a real blacksmith shop called The Old Millstone Forge in Millstone, NJ. When my mom and I went there, the first sign of a blacksmith shop was the choking smell of smoke. When we walked in the first thing we saw was rusty spare horse-shoes hanging from wooden pegs on the ceiling beams. We also saw a few

They made it red hot and hammered it on top of the anvil—Wait a minute! When I got the tour of the radio station, the old blacksmith shop, Paul Kurtzenberger was telling me about the good old days when he was a kid and would go to see “Gussie” Harned at work. Mr Kurtzenberger told me what an anvil is and explained what it was used for. Next he showed me where the forge used to be when it was a blacksmith shop. I didn’t really

understand what a forge was until I saw a real one at the Old Millstone Forge.

Some of the things blacksmiths make are: nuts, bolts, nails, wheels, armor, sewage pipes, horseshoes, fireplace pokers and much, much more. These things are very useful! You might be wondering how this historical blacksmiths shop has changed over the years. Back in the 1800’s it used to be only one story high. In 1952, John Vocke built another story on top of the original building. Another change was that there used to be a big open door-

way to bring horses and wagons into the shop. Now there is a large picture window to look out and enjoy Mother Nature!

I found out that the old blacksmith shop has been many things since 1830: a residence, a wood-burning stove store, an engineering office, an antique store, and even a mini mart.

This building has a lot of history to it!

So the next time you listen to WDVR.FM, think about all the history that can be found in this particular blacksmith shop in Sergeantsville, New Jersey.
